Commerce Park Construction

The final phase of industrial building construction is underway at Springdale Commerce Park. Walls are up for the 180,000-square-foot building at the southeast corner of Princeton Pike and Crescentville Road, with an expected completion in January 2024.

Site grading and utility work are currently underway for the 374,000-square-foot building at the southern end of the site, with expected completion in April 2024. The first two buildings constructed at the site are fully leased by Amazon, Sleep Number, Sugaright, and Zeda. The modern buildings provide flexible space for a variety of distribution or light industrial uses, and the new space will help attract additional employers and jobs to Springdale.



Artisan Village Update

The planned transformation of the former Tri-County Mall into Artisan Village has undergone some changes in response to national economic conditions. The rise in interest rates has impacted all sectors of commercial real estate, making it more difficult to obtain financing and decreasing the return on investment for developers.

City officials recently received an update from the development team. With a new financing plan in place, they hope to present an updated site plan to elected officials and the community in late summer and begin demolition and site work prior to the end of this year.

Wawa Coming to Springdale

At the June 13 Planning Commission meeting, a preliminary development plan was approved for a new Wawa convenience store and gas station at the corner of Springfield Pike and Glensprings Drive. To be located on the sites of the former Las Islas Marias restaurant and DJ's Sports Tavern, the 5,900-square-foot Wawa store will be one of the first to open in the Cincinnati area sometime in 2025.

Wawa is known for a large selection of freshly made breakfast and lunch offerings, as well as unique dessert options such as their famous Tastykakes. In addition to bringing vacant commercial property back to life, Wawa will pay for improvements to be made to the intersection of Springfield Pike and Glensprings Drive. Springdale is excited to welcome Wawa to our community!

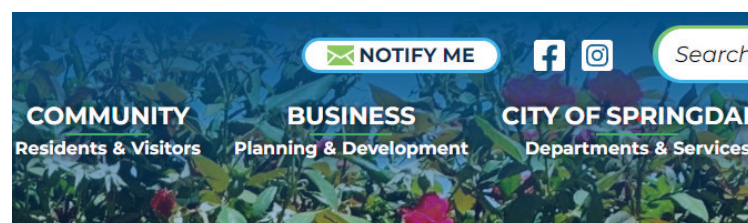


City Website Integrates Accessibility & Communication Tools

Springdale Citizens Police Academy

The next Citizens Police Academy begins on September 11. The Springdale Police Department has designed a nine-week program to give participants a working knowledge of its operations. The academy consists of a series of classes and discussions held once a week on Monday night from 6:00 p.m. until 9:00 p.m. with graduation held November 16.

Students will be instructed in the areas of:

- Overview of the Police Department and Municipal Government
- 911/Dispatch Tour
- Current Issues, Laws of Arrest, Search and Seizure
- Use of Force/Less Lethal
- Use of Force Practical Scenarios (firearms simulator)
- Patrol Tactics/OVI/Traffic Stops
- Criminal and Narcotics Investigations
- Crime Scene Investigation

The class size is limited to approximately 15 participants, and there is no cost to attend. Each participant will be provided with an academy shirt and a training manual. Prior to each class, meals donated by area restaurants and academy alumni will be provided.

All participants considered for the Springdale Citizens Police Academy must sign a waiver of liability prior to attending and may be subject to a background investigation. This is not a "Citizens on Patrol" academy, it is strictly for educational purposes.

Property Maintenance

The warmer weather that we've all waited so long for is finally here. With heat, comes lots of outdoor projects and playtime for the kiddos. Don't forget to keep your property compliant with Springdale's Property Maintenance and Zoning Codes so that everyone can enjoy their time outside worry-free. This will keep your property values up and your neighbors happy. Win, win!

Vehicle Parking & Storage

Let's talk about how to store our vehicles, both our daily drivers and the ones we keep for fun. No vehicles may be parked in the front, side, or rear yards. The only exception to this would be one recreational vehicle (RV, boat, trailer, etc.), which may be parked in your side or rear yard as long as it is 5 feet away from all property lines.

Discarding Household Items

Something else that we are seeing in yards is litter. In Springdale, you may not store or discard of any furniture, garbage, automotive parts, etc. outdoors. The only exception to this would be storing household garbage cans in the side or rear yards. If kept in the side yard, remember that the cans must be screened from the road. In all cases, the garbage must be stored in an approved, covered container.

As always, the Building Department seeks to partner with the residents of Springdale to help keep the City beautiful, property values up, and to promote the general health, safety, and welfare of its citizens. Thank you for being an integral part of this process.

City Renews Electric Aggregation Agreement

The City has renewed the agreement with Energy Harbor for electric generation services for its electric aggregation program. The rate under the program is \$0.0699 kWh and is scheduled to run from August 2023 through August 2025.

The agreement provides an option for electric generation backed by 100% renewable energy certificates (RECs) at a rate of \$0.0739 kWh. To enroll in the renewable energy offer, please call 1-866-636-3749.

Eligible residents and small commercial accounts should have received an opt-out notice from Energy Harbor in mid-June with a mid-July deadline. A follow-up notice from Duke Energy providing a second opportunity to opt out of the program was mailed by Duke Energy shortly thereafter. No action was necessary to be enrolled in the program.

New residents moving into the City that would like to take

advantage of the program may contact Energy Harbor directly at 1-866-636-3749, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and request enrollment in the City of Springdale's electric aggregation program. The Duke Energy account information will be needed at that time to complete the enrollment.

Residents who have entered into a contract on their own who would now like to enroll in the City's aggregation program are also able to contact Energy Harbor directly to request enrollment. In these instances, the City encourages residents to inquire with their current supplier as to any early termination charges. It may be beneficial for the resident to wait until their individual contract expires before joining the City's program.

Please keep in mind that Duke Energy will still be responsible for delivering power to your home or business, reading your meter, sending your bill, and restoring power following an outage.

End of Season Chipper Service

August and September opportunities to have your brush chipped at the curb will conclude this year's chipper service. Residents are encouraged to place brush, meeting the guidelines, at the curb on the Sunday before the start of each week for the last two pick-ups occurring:
August 21 - 25 & September 25 - 29

Year-round curbside yard waste collection is available through Rumpke on your regular trash collection day. Yard waste can be placed in cans or lawn bags and include grass clippings, leaves, mulch, tree limbs, bushes, tree and shrub trimmings, Christmas trees, and other vegetative or organic material. No contractor generated material is accepted.

Rumpke can also collect larger branches up to two inches in diameter which must be bundled and tied into stacks of four feet in length by two feet in width, and weigh less than 50 pounds.

Chipper service by Springdale Public Works resumes in March.

Branches between 1" and 12" in diameter accepted.

Piles neatly stacked, cut ends facing curb. Longer limbs to be placed parallel to street with cut ends facing same direction.

Garden Club News

Fall is the time to prepare gardens for the coming year by dividing hostas, daylilies, and perennials. Divided plants can help fill in an open spot in the yard or be shared with friends and neighbors. When cutting back perennials, leave about 2-4 inches exposed over the winter. This protects their roots until spring.

The months of September and October are a good time for new plantings as it gives shrubs, trees, perennials, and bulbs time to establish a root system before winter sets in. Take a look at where a shady tree or pop of color would be beneficial in the yard while considering plantings that will create a picturesque view next season!

What is Influenza (Flu)?

Influenza, also known as the flu, is an illness that can cause a high fever, a bad headache, body aches, a dry cough, a sore throat, a runny nose and makes you feel tired. It is usually spread from person to person by coughing and sneezing and can be spread before you know you are sick. Most people who get influenza will recover in one or two weeks. Very young children, pregnant women, people age 65 years and older, and anyone with a chronic medical problem are most at risk from influenza.

What can you do to protect yourself from the flu?

The best way to prevent influenza is to get the influenza vaccine. The best time to get your vaccine is between September and October each year. Flu season in Ohio can begin as early as October, usually peaks in January and February, and can end as late as May. Everyone six months of age and older should get the influenza vaccine every year because the virus can change each year.

You can help prevent the spread of influenza when you:

- Get vaccinated.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. You can use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- Cough or sneeze into the bend of your arm. When you use a tissue, be sure to throw it away after use.
- Stay home if you are sick! Avoid being around others when you are sick.
- Wear a mask! If a family member is sick with the flu, wear a face mask in public to reduce the spread of the flu, even if you aren't experiencing any symptoms.

It's Almost Time for Fall Leaf Collection

The Public Works Department is once again gearing up for the annual leaf collection program. Collection begins as soon as the leaves begin to pile up, typically during the second or third week of October.

Collection alternates weekly beginning on the west side of State Route 4 and then moving to the City's east side. As leaf volume increases, crews will finish one side of the City and immediately move to the other side. While volume is at its peak, weekly collection may not be possible, however this is a continuous service running through the designated cut-off date.

Please DO NOT place leaves in the street because stormwater flow and drainage structures can be blocked, causing the potential for roadway flooding. Instead, leaves should be placed behind the curb, but not blocking sidewalks or covering fire hydrants. Leaves must be free of all debris, such as litter, limbs, and branches. These items cannot be collected with the leaves and piles containing these items will be left until the resident removes the unacceptable material.

Bring Leaves to the Curb by December 3

This year residents will be permitted to bring leaves to the curb until Sunday, December 3, 2023. Leaves currently at the curb will continue to be collected but additional leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for regular trash collection. Beginning Monday, December 4, 2023 residents are no longer permitted to bring additional leaves to the curb.

Leaf Collection Ends December 15

Leaf collection will end this year on Friday, December 15, 2023. This will be the last day crews will be performing collection of leaves at the curb. All leaves that remain at the curb after this date must be disposed of by the residents for regular trash collection. The reason for this cutoff date is so that crews can ready the equipment for snow removal. We appreciate your cooperation in collecting the leaves that remain after December 15.
