Road crews need your help this winter

Springdale's Public Works Department is prepared for winter's worst with stockpiled road salt and plows ready for action. Residents can assist snow plow operators in their efforts to safely and efficiently clear the roadways:

- Delay non-essential travel until after the roads have been cleared.
- Park vehicles off the street. Remove items, such as basketball hoops, from the right-of-way.
- Do not deposit snow into the street when using a snow blower or shoveling a driveway. This could result in a serious accident and a citation for the person placing the snow in the street.
- Never allow children to play in snow piles along the roadway.

- If possible, wait until the plow has passed before shoveling the area of a driveway near the street.
- Stack snow on the left side of the driveway entrance (when facing the house) in order to minimize the amount of snow that may be pushed into the driveway entrance by a plow. Plows typically clear snow in the direction of normal traffic, so a large snow pile on the left side of a driveway will be pushed away from the drive entrance.
- Do not pass a snowplow or salt truck. If you cannot see the mirrors on the truck, the driver cannot see you!
- The City does not take requests for streets to be plowed. Streets are prioritized based upon traffic volume and terrain. Heaviest traveled streets get first attention so that emergency vehicles can pass. Less traveled streets like a cul-de-sac or a dead-end street are plowed last.


Mayor Webster Retires After 28 Years

At the November 15 Council Meeting, outgoing Mayor Webster was recognized by state officials and city council for his 28 years as Mayor and total of 52 years of dedicated service to the community. Ohio Governor Mike DeWine's office, Congressman Warren Davidson's office and Ohio House District 28 Representative Jessica Miranda all presented Mayor Webster with proclamations. In special recognition, Council voted unanimously on a resolution commending Mayor Webster for his service, and to rename a portion of Walnut Street to Webster Way. Rental space at the Community Center was also dedicated as, "Webster Room Rentals."

Elected in 1995, Mayor Webster retires as Springdale's seventh Mayor. Prior to being at the helm, Mayor Webster served in the elected role of Clerk of Council/Finance Director since 1971, a position he held for 24 years. Mayor Webster's early years in Springdale included community service through volunteering and coaching sports. Through recreation, former Mayor Ray Norrish met Webster and appointed him as chair of the Parks and Recreation Commission in 1970.

Mayor Webster's banking expertise was hard at work over the years, for the community, as he created a plan to make the city debt-free, while guiding municipal spending on resident services, including an \$8.2 million bond to re-pave all residential streets, and the construction of the Community Center and its expansion, as well as the police station, fire station and municipal building.

Mayor Webster was instrumental in creating many community partnerships which led to



Road Construction Project Updates

2023 has been a busy year of road construction in the City of Springdale and we certainly appreciate the patience of our residents.

Projects completed and improvement made include:

- E. Crescentville Road from Princeton Pike east to Centerdale Road in the City of Sharonville
- The E. Kemper Road Bridge over the CSX Railroad tracks
- Springfield Pike from I-275 north into the City of Fairfield
- Princeton Pike from just south of Kemper Road south into the Village of Glendale, Sheraton Lane and a portion of Ray Norrish
- W. Crescentville Rd from Springfield Pike to Princeton Pike

Projects slated for 2024 include:

 Paving on W. Crescentville Road from Springfield Pike to Princeton Pike

- Addition of sidewalks on the south side of Tri-County Parkway from Northland Boulevard to Princeton Pike
- Northland Boulevard from just west of Springfield Pike to just east of Boggs Lane

The Northland Boulevard Reconstruction Project has been under design since early 2021 and will be ready to bid through the Ohio Department of Transportation in early 2024. This is a total reconstruction of all 4 lanes which will require the complete removal and replacement of the existing pavement. Substantial storm sewer work, the development of stormwater bioswales within the existing median, sidewalk and shared use path additions and traffic signal upgrades at Tri-County Parkway.

The City has received \$7.49 million in outside funding, with the potential of additional funding for the \$8.6 million cost of the project.



Outdoor Fire Safety

For your personal safety and the safety of your property, the Ohio Fire Code requires a burn to be 50 feet from any structure. According to the Ohio Fire Code, an approved container is a portable outdoor fireplace or gas-fired recreational pit. Portable outdoor fireplaces shall be used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and shall not be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material. If your fire is not in one of the approved containers and it is less than 3 feet in diameter and less than 2 feet in

height, then it must be at least 25 feet from a structure.

Open burning, bonfires, recreational fires and use of portable outdoor fireplaces shall be constantly attended until the fire is extinguished. A minimum of one portable fire extinguisher with a minimum 4-A rating or other approved on-site fire-extinguishing equipment, such as dirt, sand, water barrel, garden hose or water truck, shall be available for immediate utilization. News In Brief

Holidays to Delay Trash Collection

Since Christmas and the New Year holidays both fall on a Monday this season, collection will be delayed one day for each of the Holiday weeks. Monday service will be on Tuesday, Tuesday on Wednesday, etc.

Holiday Tree Collection and Disposal

City crews will collect holiday trees left at the curb following the holidays. Crews will run through the City once a week in January to pick up holiday trees set out to the curb. All holiday decorations should be removed. Trees should not be placed in a plastic bag unless they are intended for trash

collection. No other brush material will be collected during this period as the chipper program will not resume until March of 2024.

Chipper Service Returns March 25th

Chipper service is set to restart on Monday, March 25, 2024. Like the previous two years, chipper service runs on the last full week of each month from March through September. This year we will be limiting the time spent at each address per month to a limit of 15 minutes. If material placed at curb cannot be chipped in 15 minutes, the remaining material will be left until the following month. Please see the City's website for additional details on what is acceptable material.

Free Mulch and Free Delivery

Each year, the City of Springdale Public Works Department offers residents of the City free bulk mulch delivered to their home. Residents can request 2.5, 5, 7.5, or 10 Cubic Yards. A 2.5 cubic yard load is similar to a pickup truck. Requests are taken on first come, first serve basis starting Tuesday, January 1, 2024. All mulch is delivered the first full week of May which will be May 6 through the 10th.
